Search for New Executive Director

With Steve Schuler's retirement, the KCIA Board of Directors is actively searching for its next Executive Director. The Board has named a screening committee to work in partnership with Roots & Legacies Consulting to identify qualified candidates.

As part of the leadership transition, other organizational changes have been announced, including Eric Fabrizius' promotion to Director of Operations. Fabrizius will serve as the interim Executive Director until Schuler's replacement is named and will assume responsibilities of his new role once the search process is completed and new leader instated.


Membership Approves Board Restructuring

The membership in attendance at our annual business meeting in February voted to approve Board redistricting. The proposal reduces the number of districts from seven to five and increases the number of at-large positions from three to five.

The five at-large positions are not restricted by region but may be held by any member. Two of the five positions may be held by non-members elected by the membership.

The proposal was brought forth due to a need to balance membership among the districts and also to enhance opportunities for members to serve on the board.

The Board remains at thirteen directors, including two KSU *ex officio* positions and a position appointed by Kansas Seed Industry Association.



KCIA Board of Directors

The KCIA Board of Directors sets policy and guides the overall direction and activities that maintain our association.

Board elections were held during our annual business meeting. Incumbents Shane Ohlde and Chris Boyd were elected for additional terms, and Ben McClure was elected as director of the Southwest District for outgoing director Matt Lobmeyer. The election was held under the new redistricted structure.

The board had appointed Caleb Sipes to finish the term as At-Large for Tyler Ediger, who had stepped down. Seed Innovation and Protection Alliance Speaks at 2024 Seed and Crops Conference

Attendees of the 2024 Seed and Crops Conference had the opportunity to learn about the importance of protecting intellectual property rights of agricultural seed developments. Presented by Eloy Corona, Executive Director of the Seed Innovation Protection Alliance (SIPA), it touched on topics such as the dollar amount seed development brings to the world-wide agriculture market, the percentage seed companies invest in R&D, and some case studies of corporate espionage.

SIPA supports the use of education to protect innovation and facilitate respect of intellectual property rights and has a number of helpful links and articles to help educate the public on the value of professionally produced and certified seed versus bin run saved seed.

Several seed companies you know are members and will be notified if anyone provides a confidential tip of illegal seed or technology use through the SIPA website (www.seedipalliance.com) or 1-844-SEED-TIP. Illegal use includes the unauthorized production of seed, saving of seed, unauthorized selling of seed, and breeding or improvements of seed.

Field/Certification notes from Marion

The deadline for field applications from summer inspected crops, such as wheat, was March 15. If you haven't submitted your applications yet, please do so immediately, but be aware that late field applications may be subject to late fees. I am in the process of reviewing all applications and I will contact you if there is any missing information or needed edits. Please make sure your maps are correctly drawn on myfields. Last year we had some significant inspector delays due to badly drawn maps and insufficient driving directions.

It is never too early to begin planning for field inspections. Take some time to review the field standards for your crops. Take note of isolation and boundary marking requirements to separate varieties and/or classes, and the limits on off-types and variants. I will be updating our variety characteristic and variant table and posting it on our website for your reference. Make sure your roguing crews know the field standards as well, particularly the list of prohibited weeds and other crops. The inspector training materials on our website could be helpful while training your crews. Last year we continued to have trouble during wheat inspections with Field Bindweed, Musk Thistle, Rye, and Triticale to name a few. I know very well how harvest season is always extremely busy, so preparing your fields for inspection early is in your best interest to avoid delays and the need for re-inspections.

KCIA is always looking for good field inspectors, so if you know anyone in your area who would be interested, please contact the office. I am also looking for qualified college students to participate in our summer internship.

Finally, I have updated KCIA's LinkedIn page, and I have plans to post more regularly on it in the coming months. This is in conjunction with an AOSCA marketing initiative to help seed certification have more of a presence online. Stories about your family or company history with seed certification could be a great way to give seed certification a voice online.
