## Keep Labels and Certificates for Seedstock Purchases

If you are buying seedstock to plant this fall for certification, please remember that you must keep the official label or seed certificate as proof of seed source for field inspection applications. It is your responsibility to ensure that the documentation for your fields is maintained, and this includes informing your personnel and contract growers to keep the labels and certificates for the seed planted in a field.

We continue to receive a few corporate tote placards with field applications. As your standards require, we will not accept these on field applications as they are not the official certification document representing the seed. You need a label, bulk sale certificate or transfer document authorized by a certification agency, identifiable by the name of the agency and its seal.

Maintaining official documentation of seed source is one of the fundamentals of seed certification. We continue to hear from certified seed sellers about requests for replacement labels from buyers who failed to keep labels for the seed they planted in fall. This is unnecessary work in the spring, especially considering how simple it is to just keep a label from the seed planted. One suggestion is take a photo with your phone at purchase/planting time, because you can upload it directly from your smartphone to your myFields application.

Please do your part to adhere to the standards, and feel free to call us if you need assistance in identifying the appropriate documentation for seedstock purchased.

## Field Prep for Planting Certified Production is On-Going Operation

Beginning with the 2022 season, by action of the Board of Directors, rejected fields will be charged the full inspection price minus research fee, plus hours and mileage incurred for reinspection. While the number of rejected fields is small relative to the total fields inspected, each rejected field represents a failure to properly prepare a field to meet minimum certification requirements that are clearly defined.

Land availability and rotational requirements may force the use of a sub-optimal field for seed production. In these cases it is important to recognize the obstacles to certification and plan ahead for clearing those obstacles by the use of pre-plant or out-of-season herbicides if available or by properly training and overseeing roguing crews to recognize problems and remedy them.

Contract growers can be problematic when assessing the suitability of their own fields, and it might be prudent to confirm suitability of contracted fields prior to planting.

If a field is rejected for other than varietal purity, the problem can be fixed and a reinspection requested based on inspector availability, but the delay and extra cost is best avoided by proper field choice and pre-season preparation. Please review the certification field requirements for the crop before committing a field to seed production. #### Side Note: Newton Monument Commemorates Arrival of Turkey Red Winter Wheat In Kansas



Inscription on plaque:

The "Mennonite Settler" designed and sculpted by artist Max Nixon (1915-2000) was dedicated by the City of Newton September 10, 1942. Funding came from citizens of Newton, the Junior Chamber of Commerce, and the U.S. Work Progress Administration (WPA).

Local wheat farmers often contributed to the fund by giving a few bushels from the fields at harvest time. The limestone sculpture represents a farmer standing in his wheat field. He holds his hat in his hands in a gesture of reverence. The tile mosaic has the message: 'Commemorating Entry Into Kansas from Russia of Turkey Red Hard Winter Wheat by Mennonites'.

In 1997 the monument was placed on the National Register of Historic Places.

A thorough restoration was completed and the rededication took place on October 1, 2000.
